Young Bangladeshis face a precarious future, despite living in one of the worlds' fastest growing economies. This is not because of a lack of job opportunities, but because of a lack of skills. Many industries are forced to import mid-level skilled manpower due to such gaps.

We focus on three areas:


1. skills for jobs:

apprenticeship and institutionbased training for young people and adults and connecting them to jobs in growth sectors, with a special focus on disadvantaged groups and labour migrants.

2. entrepreneurship and market development:

supporting entrepreneurs to start enterprises, improving working conditions in micro, small and medium enterprises and strengthening value chains to create better jobs.

3. skills sector development: developing the sector's business and management capacity through public-private pertnerships and technical consulting.

- Skills Training for Advancing Resources: Dual apprenticeship model that reintegrates dropouts back into learning and supports entrepreneurship development.
- Tailored courses: Specifically for training women in non-traditional sectors, such as pharmacy and hospitality and tourism.
- Skilling Youth through
 Partnerships: Institution-based
 training and job placement within
 the country and abroad, based on
 public-private partnerships.
- Business incubation and mentoring support: Includes customised micro loans through Business Incubation Support for Youth in the Informal Market and establishing a youth entrepreneurs network,
- Technical consulting: Support to professionals, institutions and trainers on Fire Safety and Occupational Health and Safety.
- Social Inclusion: Engaging community members to create safe spaces for young people of all sexual orientations and gender identities.

WHAT WE OFFER

We offer training in basic electronics, beauty care, block batik and screen printing, electrical installation and maintenance, embroidery and sequin crafts, graphic design, hardware maintenance, housekeeping, food and beverage service, IT support, mobile phone servicing, motorcycle servicing, refrigeration and air conditioning servicing, sewing machine operation, tailoring and dress making, Thai aluminum fabrication and carpentry.

95% of our learners secure jobs after graduation. Over half of our learners are female, 11 per cent are persons with disabilities and 70 per cent are in rural areas.

NEXT STEPS

- We aim to reach 500,000 young people, labour migrants, and marginalised groups, ensure 400,000 people are employed or creating jobs and 300,000 people are promoting decent work and social inclusion by 2020. We will do this by increasing the scale of our existing projects and through new initiatives.
- The Pro-poor Growth of Rural Enterprises through Sustainable Skills Development (PROGRESS) project will support the growth of the light engineering sector, through developing socially inclusive and dynamic micro and cottage enterprises in rural markets. Enterprises will be managed by skilled entrepreneurs and employ skilled workers. The project will reach an estimated 110,000 people.
- The BRAC Institute of Skills
 Development, a social
 enterprise, will operate as a
 registered training organisation.
 The institute will offer market
 driven training in emerging
 sectors, starting with readymade garments, retail,
 construction and hospitality and
 tourism. These four sectors have
 the largest potential for local and
 overseas employment.

The National Skills Development Policy provided a vision for skill development that has been officially recognised by government, industry and employers. Now is the time to work together to make that vision a reality. An estimated 19 million skilled workers are needed for Bangladesh to become a middle-income country by 2021.
